2. Character Architecture and Psychological Modeling

The characters in *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer* are not merely literary figures but archetypes analyzed through the lens of developmental psychology and social roles. 4. Socio-Economic Context: St. Petersburg and the Mississippi River

The geography of the novel is not merely a background but a critical component of its mechanical operation. The Mississippi River functions as the **Locus of Freedom**, while the town represents the **Locus of Constraint**.
